Lion Sam Roberts introduced our speaker, Ms. Amber Thornton, Director of the Cullman County Public Library System (CCPLS). Ms. Thorton was recently appointed to this position following 20 years as an educator at Cullman Middle School.

Amber began with some history stating that County Library's main facility was built in 1967, but the library's origin goes back to the days of Colonel John Cullman in the 1890's. She then gave some impressive 2024 facts about how much our library has been used for the benefit of our local citizens. The current library building had started with 30,000 books, but its collection now stands at 80,000. Last year it had 222,000 visits with 129,000 checked out. 33,000 citizens have library cards. Ms. Thornton then praised services that a lot of people do not realize. That is, it has 287 free programs which were utilized by 6,900 users. It has 16 computers available for public use. And it's staff offer assistance to

those who need help with using computers or in setting up mobile phones. It also offers tax forms and help in filing one's taxes. This assistance is called the "Borrow a Librarian Program." They also direct people in need to local charities such as "Curt's Closet" and "Cullman Caring for Kids." 871 children participated in its summer reading program in 2024.

The problem with some of those numbers is that the fire code for the library only allows 53 people at a time in the building. Recently, one of the building sides partially collapsed due to the weight of books it was supporting; this was repaired, but the roof needs replacing, and the building has other age-related problems. The County provides salaries for the library's staff, and the City provides funds for upkeep and utilities. The City also donated the land upon which the library stands.

The solution for the issues mentioned, and one that Ms. Thornton is heavily involved with, is the expansion and renovation of the Cullman Library building. The goal here is to bring the building up to current codes, comply with ADA laws, and gain additional space to better meet the needs of the community. The new space will provide designated areas for children, study rooms, meeting spaces, and a bookstore. The estimated cost is around \$6M. A campaign is underway to seek funds from local businesses, individuals, and grants. So far, \$700,000 has been raised with a goal of \$2M from local community support. It is hoped that \$4M will be provided through a Federal Grant. Amber appears to have been an excellent choice as director of CCPLS who is eager and excited to

make huge increases in service to our City and County.

The BOD also passed a motion for our Club to pay for our Club members' meals at the "Empty Bowls" event.

Lion Steve Cartee continued issuing Fish & Ham Dinner tickets to all Club members and began taking cash and checks for those tickets

Lion Randy Kraft reported on the Alabama Fairs Association Convention that was held at our Fairgrounds this past Friday. The Convention was highly successful, and the Association made a hefty donation to our Club. The Cullman High School Jazz Band put on a professional show as entertainment. Lion Randy had high praise for Lion James Pinyan and his wife, Lion Cindy Pinyan, who decorated Bldg. #1 for this event; there were many complements for our Fairground facilities. Lion Randy noted that he was elected as 1st Vice President of this Association and that Lion Brad Mitchell was elected 2nd Vice President. Also, he noted that Lion Bill Ruehl was elected as Director of District 2, which covers Fayette, all the way over to Cullman, Marshall, and Etowah counties. The Alabama Fairs Association also gave our Club a plaque for hosting their event this year. Lion Randy also noted that the Mayor gave an opening "Welcome to the Convention" and introduced himself as Mayor Lion Woody Jacobs.
